

# MENSTRUAL MATTERS: MAKING MENSTRUAL HEALTH ACCESSIBLE IN ASL

We're thrilled to share an exciting new resource created to make menstrual health education more inclusive and accessible for the Deaf community: Menstrual Matters: Understanding Menstrual Health in ASL.

This groundbreaking ASL video series, produced by Periods for All in collaboration with Link! SRS, has officially launched on YouTube and TikTok. You might spot our very own, Rebecca Leckie, in the videos – a passionate educator and advocate who played a key role in bringing this vision to life.

For too long, people who use ASL have had very limited access to information about menstrual health. Menstrual Matters fills that gap by offering a welcoming, inclusive space for learning. The videos cover a wide range of topics including:

- What is a Period
- Menstrual Cycles
- Common Concerns and Myths
- Menopause

Each video breaks down complex information into simple, accurate, and affirming content for people of all ages and gender identities who menstruate, or simply want to understand more about it.

"This whole thing started as a dream to make menstrual health education accessible in ASL," says the Periods for All team. "Without community support, it would've stayed just that—a dream. But here we are, and we're getting goosebumps thinking about the people who will finally have access to information they've been waiting for."

The launch marks more than just the release of a few videos, it's a milestone in health equity and accessibility. By combining visual storytelling, ASL, and inclusive education, Menstrual Matters helps dismantle stigma while empowering Deaf and hard-of-hearing individuals with essential knowledge about their bodies.

The creators are calling on everyone—community partners, educators, and advocates—to help spread the word. Every view, like, and share helps boost visibility so these videos can reach more people who need them most.

"We're not just launching videos," says Holly Johnston and Carly Pistawka from Periods for All.

"We're opening doors for people who've been left out of these conversations for far too long."

On September 19th, we spent the day celebrating local inclusive employment champions at Open Door Group's 12th annual **Untapped Workplace Inclusion Awards**. Representatives from posAbilities Employment Service (PES) and our Social Media Fellowship were honoured to attend. We're especially proud to celebrate one of our own: **Hannah Nolan**, Social Media Fellowship Lead who received a nomination for the **Untapped Inclusion Champion Award (Individual)**. The nomination recognized Hannah for her leadership, storytelling, and advocacy in advancing accessibility and inclusion through digital platforms. Her work exemplifies how inclusive hiring practices empower both individuals and organizations to grow.

Hannah shares: "I'm truly honored to be recognized among such incredible champions for inclusion! The work toward greater accessibility and equity is ongoing, but events like this, hosted by the amazing Open Door Group, leave me feeling so inspired and hopeful. Grateful to be part of this journey!"



# Film, Dialogue and the Power of Storytelling

October's Community Inclusion Month invites reflection, dialogue, and action. Films and talkback events offer an opportunity to explore pressing social issues that shape the lives of people with disabilities. We recommend viewing the following documentaries, which are a stark reminder that we need to continue to lift the voices of self-advocates, and to challenge the institutional thinking that still influences our systems today. People's lives depend on it.

At this year's **Vancouver International Film Festival (VIFF)**, **Life After** captured national attention for its exploration of Medical Assistance in Dying (MAiD). The documentary followed the stories of American and Canadian persons with disabilities who had requested to end their lives, and highlighted that the choice was made due to inadequate supports making them feel as though they had no other viable alternative. At the **KPU Surrey Campus**, Dr. Fiona Whittington-Walsh facilitated a Community Inclusion Month event, co-hosted by Kwantlen Polytechnic University, BC People's First, and BC's Self Advocate Leadership Network. The 2024 documentary film **These Four Walls: A Documentary on the Manitoba Developmental Centre** was shown, followed by a keynote presentation by Dr. Michael Bach, internationally renowned researcher and community leader on ways to advance the full inclusion and human rights of persons with disabilities. Also on the topic of human rights – is the right to love. Together with InWithForward, Burnaby Association for Community Inclusion and Kinsight, we continue to seek out opportunities to increase social awareness and effect change in the way people of all ages, genders, orientations and abilities are included in our society. We are proud to be a part of the Connecting Queer Communities (CQC) initiative and Co-Executive Producers of the film, "A Place Where I Belong".

Our feature film has been connecting audiences, sparking conversations, and raising awareness about the experiences of 2SLGBTQIA+ people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (ID/D). In September, its world premiere was at the Vancouver Queer Film Festival (VQFF), drawing packed audiences and strong media coverage. Producer Rheanna Toy, Cloudstreet Media was honoured to receive the Narrative Change Award, the first Canadian feature ever to do so. Presented by activist and actor Rain Dove, the award celebrates films that challenge outdated narratives and inspire social change.

The screening included a vibrant drag show with Amanda Peters, Whore-ia Estefan, and Jaylene Tyme and a 40-minute panel featuring voices from the 2SLGBTQIA+ and ID/D community. Audience surveys reflected meaningful impact: "This is the most important film I've seen in years" and "I laughed and cried. It's a true eye opener."

The event also raised \$1,250 for CQC and created new connections with potential long-term funders.

Since its World Premiere, the film has been screened at Cinema Diverse – Palm Springs LGBTQ+ Film Festival (U.S. Premiere), and at the Serving It Right Conference in Prince George, BC, a conference for front-line workers.

Next steps include partnering with Story Money Impact to plan future Canadian screenings focused on social impact, developing a discussion guide to accompany the film and facilitate learning, and expanding festival submissions and exploring additional screening opportunities. # Grandmama's Café: Serving Community, Comfort, and Connection in Kerrisdale

There's a new warmth brewing in Kerrisdale — and it's coming from **Grandmama's Café**, a cozy, family-run spot with a heart as big as its menu. Purchased by longtime resident **Gary Tang** and his family in June 2025, the café reopened a month later after a few loving touches — fresh paint, a refreshed menu, and a renewed mission to serve both great food and great purpose.

For Gary and his wife **Esther**, who is also the café's main chef, Grandmama's is much more than a business — it's a **non-profit venture rooted in inclusion and community spirit**. Together with a small team of full- and part-time staff — including several individuals with intellectual/developmental disabilities — they've created a welcoming space that feels like home for everyone who walks through the door.

"We've lived in Kerrisdale since 2000," Gary shares. "It's been a wonderful place for our children to grow up, and we wanted to give back to our neighbourhood by creating a place where everyone feels comfortable — especially those who need a little extra support."

The relaxed pace of Kerrisdale made it the perfect home for Grandmama's, where the rhythm of work is thoughtful and unhurried. "That atmosphere really suits our team," Gary explains. "It allows them to thrive and feel confident at work."

The menu reflects the same care and thoughtfulness. Customers rave about the **tuna melt sandwich** — a tribute to Gary's late wife, **Cathy**, and their daughter **Faith's** favourite meal — as well as the **spicy chicken waffle breakfast**. Gary's personal pick? The **chef's salad with Esther's secret sauce**, a healthy and delicious option that keeps guests coming back for more.

Behind the scenes, Grandmama's is proud to **source ingredients locally**, supporting nearby chefs and bakers while finishing everything fresh in-house. And yes, for the breakfast lovers — **all-day breakfast** is still a mainstay, with waffles, toasts, eggs, and open-faced sandwiches served from morning till close.

But what truly sets Grandmama's apart is its mission. Inspired by Cathy's dream of creating opportunities for individuals with developmental disabilities, the café is now a **training ground for life and job skills** — a place where their daughter **Grace** and others can learn, grow, and belong. In the new year, Faith will return from New York to help carry that vision forward by expanding the café's employment training program.

Each day, Grandmama's brings together food, community, and comfort in small but meaningful ways. As Gary recalls, one recent visitor from Abbotsford was so moved by the café's uplifting atmosphere and music that he reached out later to say the experience had inspired him deeply.

That's the heart of **Grandmama's Café** — a place where kindness flows and confidence grows alongside every cup of coffee served.

### Families Together, Rocking for Autism and More

On September 28, 2025 **Rock4Autism 9** made its return to Port Moody's Legion Hall 119, showcasing the talents of musicians on the autism spectrum and those who identify as neurodiverse, and celebrating the power of music to foster creativity and connection. Started by the Picard family to create awareness, acceptance and employment for folks on the autism spectrum, this annual event is a much anticipated dose of good vibes year after year!

The 2025 Show featured **Rock Squad**, with lead singer Marshall hailing from Sayward, a community on Northern Vancouver Island, supported by **Luc and Friends**; the **Mayday Youth Choir**; and **Jennifer Diamond and Friends**.

Together they delivered decades of rock, and we sang, danced and socialized all afternoon! Event proceeds from food sales, a 50/50 draw and raffle tickets were donated to the **Autism Society of BC**.

It's events like this, that can ladder folks up to more opportunities – like an appearance onstage at the **2024 Project Everybody Festival** (December 3, 2024), a live concert in the Kootenays (July 24, 2025), and currently in the planning stages – a **Luc and Friends Summer Tour!** 

Families supporting families is one of our biggest strengths as a movement in BC. In this case, these two dads – **Guy Picard** and **Ben Postmus**, who hit it off right away – are carving out a path to inclusion through music. Last October, Ben, the founder and Executive Director of <u>Diverse Family Roots Society</u> in the Kootenays, reached out to Guy to see if Luc and Friends would be interested in heading over to Trail for their first **Celebration of Inclusion** event, to be held outdoors at Gyro Park.

Guy, of course, agreed! Then they got down to business. Ben secured funding from the **Trail Arts Council**, so that Luc and Friends could be paid for their gig, and had support for their travel and accommodation costs. Given that Trail's **Music in The Park** series of events is a huge draw in their community, Ben took advantage of the profile and saw an opportunity to shine a spotlight on inclusion. The Celebration of Inclusion concert was a success for all involved, with guests asking for this fabulous band to come back!

These two proud papas are now planning a summer tour for 2026, visiting several Kootenay communities.
